in your life. Keep in mind that they want to make you stronger, smarter, more curious, and more innovative. They want you to become one of the strongest, most in-demand America.



myself to 4 years of boredom while others party in all those other cities? If you haven't had these thoughts, you're already off to a good start.

Having traveled to all of the aforementioned places and seen some of the best scenes in our world, I'm here to tell you that I am still here and that these feelings are perfectly normal. You made the right choice. So, calm down. Parents, your 50 large has not gone to waste.

It is quite unnerving if you are not a Midwest native. You find yourself asking "where are all the buildings?" or "why is there so much corn?" "Why are these people so weird?" or "how can they be this bad at driving?" These questions will often be accompanied by resentful feelings and you will start to close off and become pessimistic and antagonistic towards Terre Haute.

This is the textbook reaction to being pulled from one culture and plugged into another. Dr. Schumacher would call it "culture shock" and it is perfectly normal. Everyone goes through it — even me. The first time you lay eyes, ears, nose, touch, and taste to another

community or culture, it will most likely be different from your own. Obviously Terre Haute does not rate very highly when considering cosmetics.

"Hautians" speak with a Midwest accent — very accentuated vowels and hard consonants that are often difficult for international students or even native English speakers to decipher. Roadhouses and Steakhouses are in great abun-

dance, along with fast food; however, "exotic" dining experiences are very limited when considering the aforemen-

tioned cities. These cons are frequently cited among Rose students and alumni.

But, everyone resists change and exaggerates these cons. It is human nature to stick to what you know, and you don't know Terre Haute yet. So these negative feelings are perfectly natural. Cowboys & Aliens is just inches from greatness

Spoiler alert: if you haven't seen the movie... you might not want to continue on until you have.

Cowboys & Aliens is an old story with

a new take; those who would complain about this movie should learn to expand their horizons. While the mix of genres does seem like a recipe for disaster, it actually makes for a creative new storyline. However, this is not to say that the two genres were meant to go together or are easily mixed. After all, for a western, quite a few liberties were taken;

Oscars, but it definitely deserves the status of must-see.

when regarded as a sci-fi film, these liberties are expected. Regardless, the film uses an excellent device to bring the two ideas together. If not for the unoriginal characters, I believe this movie could have been one of the top movies at the box of-

fice this year.

The device that is key to bringing the film together is an interesting take on a historic feature of the Wild West: gold. It seems so simple, yet it has never been used before. The one thing that drives storylines in Westerns can easily be used

to draw aliens there too, as they could use this resource for fuel. So, now the question presents itself: What would happen if aliens showed up in the old west?

While the movie starts in a traditional abandoned town with a single rich rancher (Harrison Ford) calling the shots, it quickly

adds the mysterious outlaw Jake Lonergan (Daniel Craig) and an even more enigmatic woman (Olivia Wilde). Lonergan quickly earns himself a reputation in town when he takes on the foolish son of the rich rancher Dolarhyde. The sher-

iff arrests them both for their disorderly conduct and is ready to send them off to the marshal when terror strikes. Dolarhyde rides into town to spring his son, but he is cut short by aliens attacking and kidnapping people. Lonergan gains his freedom by using a strange, bracelet ray gun; the next day, the town forms a posse to track down the alien whose ship Lonergan shot down. When several characters are killed and the trail seems cold, a 'Deus ex machina' saves the day and pushes the story onward.

Cowboys & Aliens plays on the Wild West to create a unique twist on a familiar story. The movie falls short in its attempts to add mysteries to characters that it doesn't have time to explain; it also tries to lengthen the stories of already stereotypical characters. It does however, mix the genres very well, and it has plenty of action to keep audiences on the edge of their seats.

Cowboys & Aliens finished well at the end of July, slightly better than expected, topping concurrent releases like *The Smurfs*. However, the success is probably attributable more to the star power of Ford, Craig, and Wild, rather than a stunning plot.

This movie certainly won't win any Oscars, but it definitely deserves the status of must-see.


