## News Briefs

### NSF grant funds more experiments

A \$50,000 grant from the National Science Foundation will soon change the way mechanical engineering courses are taught at Rose-Hulman.

New equipment purchased with NSF funds will increase the use of experiments using sophisticated instrumentation, says Lee Shirely, professor of mechanical engineering and director of the grant.

As a result of the two-year funding, new instrumentation systems will be purchased that will make it possible to use experiments in non-laboratory courses that previously had to rely on lecture type presentations, Shirely explained.

The equipment, which will be housed in new mechanical engineering facilities made possible by the \$14 million Moench Hall renovation, will be used in at least a dozen different undergraduate classes.

"The NSF support will enable us to introduce laboratory experiences in a variety of courses in engineering sciences, engineering design and manufacturing processes. Our goal is to provide students with the opportunity to use experimental systems that are similar to what they will encounter in industrial and governmental laboratories," Shirely pointed out.

### Rose, St. Mary's receive UPS grants

Rose-Hulman, Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College and DePauw University are among 20 Indiana private colleges and universities that have received a grant of \$1,900 each from the United Parcel Service Endowment Fund.

The colleges are members of the Associated Colleges of Indiana (ACI) which distributed a total of \$38,000 from the UPS fund to Hoosier institutions.

The funds will be used primarily for scholarships and student aid.

This year more than \$1 million will be generated by the fund to 600 independent colleges and universities throughout the country. During the PAST 13 years, Indiana private colleges have received \$202,260 from UPS, according to ACI.

"This commitment by United Parcel Service reflects the increasing awareness of American business and industry to maintain excellence in private higher education," stated Lynn Kirkby, executive director of ACI.

### Air Force scholarships awarded

Seventeen freshmen attending Rose-Hulman have been awarded Air Force ROTC scholarships. Each scholarship is worth over \$40,000. The Air Force ROTC is an educational program designed to provide students with the opportunity to become Air Force officers while completing their college education. ## Commission on International Students formed

The number of international students at Rose-Hulman is growing each year. A total of 30 international students will be attending Rose this year. The students come from a wide variety of backgrounds, representing a total of 14 countries. Because of this growth, Rose-Hulman President Dr. Samuel F. Hulbert, is organizing the President's Commission on International Students to assess several aspects of this growing group of students.

The commission is one of a series of commissions that have evaluated many aspects of Rose-Hulman. Among these areas have been academic services, the honor code, admissions and co-education.

The commissions set the course for a larger overall plan that guides the progress of Rose-Hulman. The long range plan is titled "Excellence in a Changing Environment." Each commission has consisted of members of the Board of Managers, administration, faculty, staff and the student body.

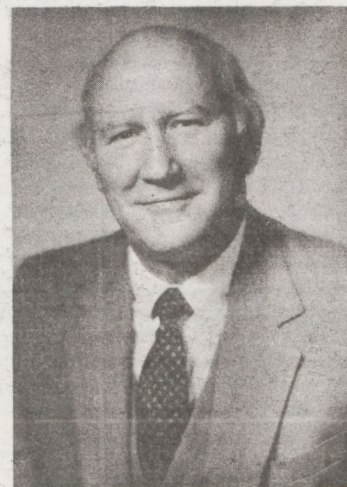
The purpose of the President's Commission on International Students is to evaluate the

school's policies regarding international students. Some of the matters that the committee will be studying will be the optimum number of international students that should be admitted, the distribution of the countries represented by these students at Rose-Hulman, the counselling needs of these students, and the financial needs of these students.

In a memorandum concerning the organization of the commission, Dr. Hulbert said that while the growing number of international students at Rose-Hulman was good, he said he felt that Rose-Hulman needed a specific plan governing its policies regarding international students to meet their various needs.

In an interview, Dr. Hulbert said that he feels college is a good place to knock down prejudices. He added that the presence of international students can help to teach American students to respect other opinions and ways of life.

The commission will consist of two members of the Board of Managers, four administrators, seven faculty members, and two students.

## \$20 million invested in Moench

Twenty million dollars is not a drop in the hat. But this is how much the renovation of Moench Hall and the new equipment to go in it will have costed by the end of the project explained Ronald Reeves, Vice President for Development and External Affairs. Fortunately for students, this in no way means a massive tuition hike. The construction and purchase of equipment is divided between grants, private gifts, and tax exempt bond issues.

The construction costs were covered by many donations with two grants in particular. The Lilly Endowment, Incorporated, started by the Eli Lilly family offered a half million dollar grant if Rose-Hulman could find enough money to match it. This was matched by other companies' donations. The second grant was from the Kresge Foundation which is maintained by the same company as K-Mart Stores.

In addition to these grants, the school sold tax exempt bonds, the income of which is guaranteed by Rose-Hulman. Mr. Reeves explained that these were like a low interest loan that would be paid off over twelve

years. With two years taken care of, the rest of the payments are: \$800,000 per year for 1986-87; \$1.35 million per year for 1988-93; and \$2.1 million per year for 1994-97. These bonds will be paid off by alumni and friends of Rose-Hulman.

Companies' gifts of equipment and donations also provide Moench with furnishings. A hypothetical example offered by Mr. Reeves would be that some companies would match a grant for \$500,000 making a total of \$1 million. Then Rose would buy \$1.5 million worth of equipment on discount from equipment vendors.

Mr. Reeves stated that this was a "major project to undertake and a big chance to sell bonds and pay them back." This deficit financing requires a "major fundraising effort." Although a risk, it was chosen the best option over many others.

The first option would have been to tear down Moench and build an entirely new structure. But as Mr. William Mullin, Director of Facilities, pointed out, classes still had to be held as the construction went on and without a building this would be impossible. In addition, Moench is a

historic part of the campus and is very nostalgic for the alumni of Rose.

A second renovation option would have been to construct sections at a time. However, this would have involved an unknown completion date since building would be dependent upon what money was available. Also, it is less expensive to have a construction company come in at once rather than having one or more come and go over time.

The present method of funding the construction is also quicker than the possibility of gathering money for years and then starting construction. The need for improvement was great enough to warrant selection of the most immediate approach.

The fifteen million dollar Moench Hall should be complete well within the next six months and will hopefully be furnished within two to three years. Mr. Reeves pointed out that it could take \$1 million dollars per year to keep up to date in departments such as EE because of the rapid progress of technology. At any rate, Rose-Hulman will be busy finishing payments until the class of 1998 graduates.

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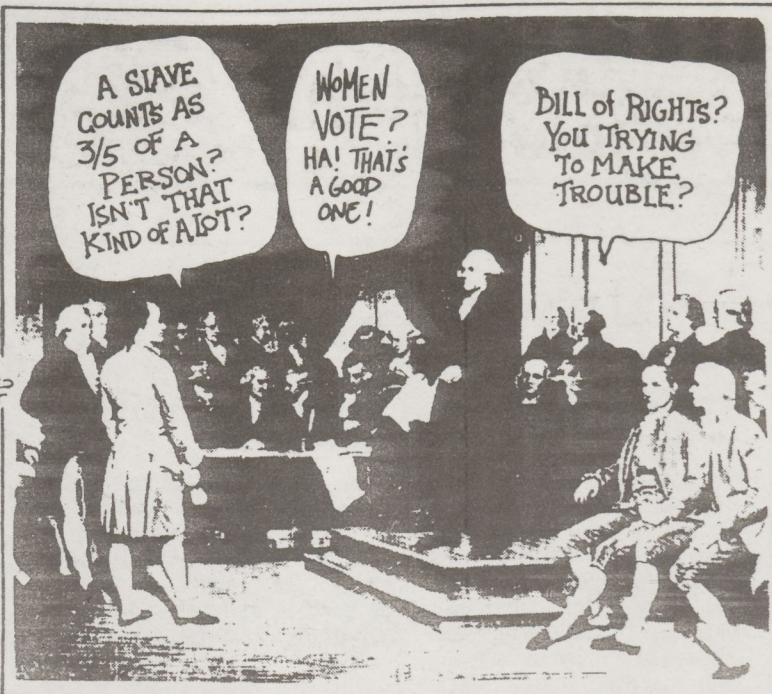
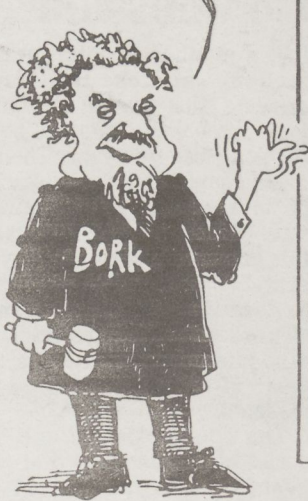

## Just for the record: 'Radio KAOS'

I'm not what you'd call a die-hard Pink Floyd fan, but the band has put out three albums that I consider to be extraordinary in their depth and meaning: *Dark Side of the Moon*, *The Wall*, and *The Final Cut*. The key creative force behind those three particular albums — a student-of-life named Roger Waters — has released a new album.

Radio KAOS is Waters' second solo album since the 1983 demise of the Floyd. His first album, *The Pros and Cons of Hitchhiking*, was not the critical and commercial breakthrough insiders had expected. But Radio KAOS is.

K.A.O.S. is a fictional FM radio station in Los Angeles. Wa-

ters uses it as a soapbox to speak out against how impersonal and uncaring modern society has become. It's a story about a boy named Billy, a human vegetable, and Jim, a renegade K.A.O.S. DJ who becomes Billy's friend through his only mode of communication: Billy can re-

Wall. However, it also contains a lot of the same political and economic criticism that bogged-down *The Final Cut*.

Yet the one nice consistency of Waters' material still holds true: he writes great music. It's no mistake that fourteen years after its release, *Dark Side of the Moon* is still on the Hot 100. Waters is an excellent composer and musician. On his latest album, Roger Waters has shown just how musically creative he really can be.

Although some people will probably consider Radio KAOS to be an entire album of rehashed material, many will view it as I do: another excellent statement to remind us that people have to get along together. I would recommend buying Radio KAOS for the music, but you should listen to it for the sentiment.

The Rose-Hulman Cross Country Team defeated 11 teams to capture the 16th Annual Danville Invitational title, by amassing only 46 points, and seven individual prizes. The great depth of the team was shown by the "B" team capturing 5th place in the meet. The fast course was covered by Rose's top runner, Kenny Roberts in a time of 26 minutes and 53 seconds. Mark Tebbe was close behind in a time of 26 minutes and 57 seconds.

Coach Bill Welch believes the number of runners helped the

team run together. He complimented the team for accomplishing team goals, such as good grouping, competitiveness, and mental approach, but says the team will continue to work on these and other goals throughout the season.

The next meet of the season will be Homecoming day (Saturday, Oct. 10) at 11 a.m. on the Rose-Hulman campus against Wabash College. Coach Welch comments that "we have a good chance to win if we run well."

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## Engineers dominate Principia

Rose-Hulman produced its highest offensive output in over a decade, bowling over hapless Principia in a non-conference football game last Saturday. The victory upped Rose's winning streak to nine in a row, making it the longest current college winning streak in Indiana.

The Engineer's dominated the field, collecting 532 total yards; 105 of them being return yards. Rose also had great control, managing to score on their first eight possessions and only having to punt once the whole game.

Six quarterbacks were used throughout the game, combining for 261 yards passing. Junior quarterback Jason Duff had another good showing, having 14 completions out of 17 attempts for 183 yards and throwing two touchdowns, one being a 57-yard strike to Brian Bartley to start off the second half. That scoring pass, Duff's last play in the game, increased his season total to 10 touchdown passes in four games; he's only four passes away from tying his own record for touchdown passes in a season.

Rushing duties were split this time, having two players gaining over 100 yards. In the first half, Tony Broadnax assumed his reg-

ular duties, rushing for 103 yards in 16 carries and scoring once. In the second half, Neil Rumsey took over, rushing for 110 yards on 14 carries and scoring two touchdowns. Rob Messmer also contributed two short-yardage touchdowns, gaining 21 yards on 5 carries.

The Engineers' defense had a fun afternoon, shutting down Principia's passing game to 105 net yards, recovering two fumbles, and sacking the quarterback three times. Brett Starr gave another great effort, having 10 tackles (seven unassisted) and a sack. Curt Gobreshi also had a great game, making seven unassisted tackles, eight overall, including a sack. Doug Ankney blocked another punt, his second game in two games, setting up an early touchdown for Rose.

"We executed really well on offense," commented Head Coach Scott Duncan. "I don't care who you are playing, it is hard to score on your first eight possessions." He further said, "The defense played pretty well. It gave up one big play, but other than that Principia earned everything they got."

The Engineers travel next to Olivet, Michigan, in hopes of pushing their winning streak to ten games.

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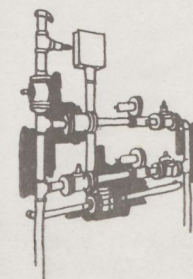
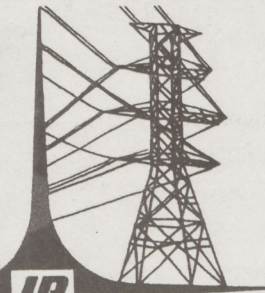
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## Homecoming Queen Candidates
