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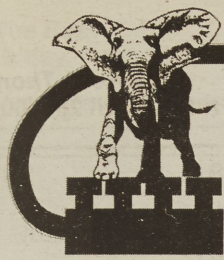

SWE's annual Girl Scout Day promotes women in engineering

Last Saturday, Society of Women Engineers (SWE) held their largest Girl Scout Day ever. While SWE has been holding this event for four years now, this was the most successful due to the new organization of the event.

Headed by Jenny Diedrich, sophomore chemical engineer, the program has undergone large changes. The program now has seven stations that the girls attend instead of four. The change was brought about by the fact that, since the program's inception, SWE has received more requests for participation than they had room for. Diedrich wanted to change all of that.

"I changed it because our contact at the regional Girl Scout Office was telling me that we had 200 requests for participation. I knew we could make the program more efficient without having to dramatically increase the amount of volunteers, and so we could increase the number of girls we could have."

The new design has almost

doubled the enrollment, as 65 girls participated in this session.

The increase is due to the excellent relations between SWE and other organizations on campus. Both Rose-Hulman sororities sent equipment and members to help out. Girl Scout Day had long relied on donated time from some of Rose's clubs, namely Aerial Robotics, Solar Phantom, and the Flying Club, but these clubs would just come for part of the day and talk to the girls in mass rather than in small groups.

This meant that the program could only accommodate about 40 girls, since that was the maximum time spent at each of the engineering stations considered to be effective.

With the new design, the girls rotate through stations for mechanical, electrical, chemical, and civil engineering, the Flying Club, Aerial Robotics and a joint station with Solar Phantom and newly involved AXE. Five of the stations have active Girl Scout participation, with the addition of the paper airplane design with the Flying

girls asked during the Solar Phantom and Aerial Robotics presentations.

"Before the girls in the back couldn't see the car or the helicopter and now the girls are with their own troops and aren't as shy about asking questions."

The Girl Scouts certainly had rave reviews for the new format. Christina Harris of Troop 352, particularly enjoyed the new Flying Club station "I like playing with the planes because we got to make our own."

Jessica Geiger of Troop 489, preferred the civil engineering station. "I liked building the bridge."

All of the stations were a big hit. Diedrich gives the credit to the club's increased help. "We requested more from the clubs then ever and they really did a good job."

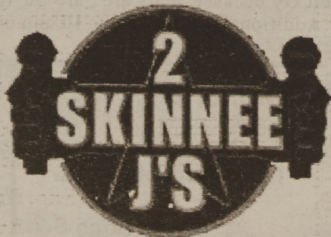

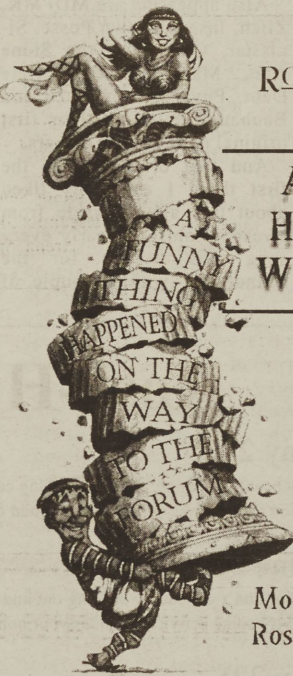
By this time all freshmen, sophomores, and juniors should have received a petition to run for class president. If you believe you have ideas that could help the student body, you are encouraged to run.

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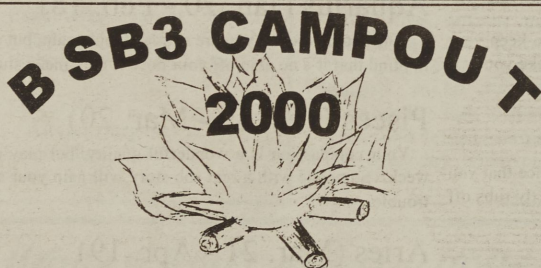

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Heavy Metal 2000: Finally, a soundtrack that kicks some ass

Those of you who have seen the original 1981 *Heavy Metal* animated movie probably remember the distinctively non-heavy metal soundtrack that went with it.

I mean, come on, Journey was on it, for Pete's sake.

Fortunately, that problem has been corrected for the soundtrack to the sequel, *Heavy Metal 2000*. No slow songs, no Don Felder, and, best of all, no Journey (couldn't resist another shot at those guys).

Kevin Eastman, the main driving force behind the adult comic magazine *Heavy Metal*, says in the album's liner notes that one of the priorities of this

new cinematic installation of the series was to "put together some of the hottest bands out there into scenes that were created specifically for music."

Without having seen the movie yet (it's not out yet, as far as I know) I would say that they succeeded pretty well.

Featured on the soundtrack are such luminaries as Monster Magnet, Pantera, Days of the New, System of a Down, Full Devil Jacket, Billy Idol (who also does one of the voices in the movie), and Coal Chamber.

Also appearing are MDFMK, Zilch, Insane Clown Posse, Sinistar, Queens of the Stone Age, Machine Head, Hate Dept., Puya, Apartment 26, and Bauhaus, recording their first original material in 16 years.

And that brings me to the first thing I especially liked about this album (aside from awesome music): nearly every song was written for the soundtrack, with a couple of

exceptions.

A refreshing fact, given that most soundtracks anymore simply use songs that groups have recorded previously and slap them on the album. *The Matrix* soundtrack was a case in point although I still like it.

Another aspect I appreciated: no songs longer than about five minutes (except for the Bauhaus song). I've never really liked songs that seem to drag on forever. Short, quick, to the point; that's how a song should be, and that's how most of the songs are on this album.

Hot spots on the album include Monster Magnet's "Silver Future," a quasi-psychedelic piece with a blasting chorus. It was this song that drove my interest for this album, as it has been released as a single and is being played on WZZQ.

Other favorites include "Dirt Ball" by Insane Clown Posse, for its humor value if nothing

else, "Immortally Insane" by Pantera, "Stored" by System of a Down, and "Wishes" by Coal Chamber.

Complaints? Few. One thing is that there is a noted lack of Korn on the album; I mean, they did a song for that awful Schwarzenegger flick *End of Days*, why not this? They would've been a hell of a lot better than Machine Head, at any rate.

There are a couple of songs, as well, that I thought were mediocre at best, including "Missing Time" by MDFMK and Sinistar's "Psychosexy." Not particularly bad, but usually skipped when in my CD player.

Overall, with four being classic and one being any of the myriad *Titanic* soundtracks, I would give this album a 3.8. I'm very anxious to see the action sequences that go with these songs; if this soundtrack is any indication, they should be pretty damn good.

SGA Meeting makes sub senator feel subpar

A quorum problem means that there are not enough people in attendance to make valid decisions. Instead, he went to the trouble of finding a sub. A sub is a student from the same district as the senator and who has the same voting privileges as the senator at the meeting. Senators try to find substitutes who are involved on campus and know about what is going on in the school. I got to the meeting and found my representative's spot. I listened to the reports from officers and found that a main reason SGA had scheduled this meeting was they had lost quorum at the last week's meeting, as some people had had to leave in the middle of the meeting, and two of their decisions were invalid. We moved on to cover the two issues from the previous week. Presentations were made by two parties asking for money and then by the financial committee. Motions were made and the amounts decided upon last week were again approved, this time they were valid. One of the groups requesting funds was represented by a senator. The meeting moved on, and raising the Student Activity Fee was the next

issue on the agenda. After this was introduced, the same senator mentioned above moved to table the issue, citing that there were too many subs in attendance and not enough senators. The issue could not be tabled at that point as no motion had been made on the issue. There must be a motion on the floor to be tabled. At this point, the attendance records were checked and 10 of the 44 people who could vote were subs. A motion would have needed 23 votes to pass. There was some discussion, and a motion was made. The same senator then moved to table the issue again. This time a vote was taken and the issue tabled. Soon there after, the meeting was adjourned. After talking with other subs, I found that we left the meeting feeling like SGA, or at least some of its members, did not see us as important as senators. The issue of increasing Student Activity Fees affects me and every other returning student the same as it affects any representative, but yet we were not given the chance to discuss and vote on it at this meeting. I wonder why all these subs and I were allowed to discuss and approve funding for the two groups when we were not able to vote on the Activities Fees increase. Especially as it affects every student, subs included, directly.

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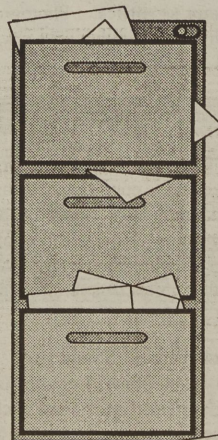


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Track and field teams sprint to ninth place finishes

Rose-Hulman's men's and women's teams both picked up ninth place finishes in the Millikin University invitational track and field meet last weekend.

The scorers for the women were Beth Nixon with fifth and sixth placed finishes in javelin and shot put, Anna Burgner with a fifth place finish in the 400 meter intermediate hurdles, and Hana Rumpf came in sixth in the 3000 meter. Rumpf's performances included personal bests in the 1500 and the 3000 meter events.

Phil Reksel, Dave Lawrence, Mark Stetzer, and Andrew Schipper led the men's team in scoring with their performances. Reskel won the intermediate hur-

dles with a meet record time of 53.16, and ran a split leg of 47.8 on the fourth place 4 x 400 relay team.

Lawrence placed second in shot put with a personal best of 44' 8". Stetzer placed sixth and seventh in the 100 and 200 meter dashes, respectively, while also running a personal best time for the lead leg of the 4 x 400 relay. Schipper placed third in the pole vault.

Coach Welch commented, "We had nine personal bests among the men and women, and several season bests. Hannah Rumpf had two of the personal bests, ran well. Hopefully we got ourselves in a good frame of mind for

Nationally-ranked Southwestern outpitches Rose in first game of SCAC tournament

Rose to pick up pieces for today's game versus Millsaps

MILLINGTON, Tenn. - Southwestern University right-handed pitcher Forrest Martin allowed only one hit and drummed up ten strikeouts over seven shutout innings, leading the Tigers to a 10-1 victory over Rose-Hulman on Thursday night.

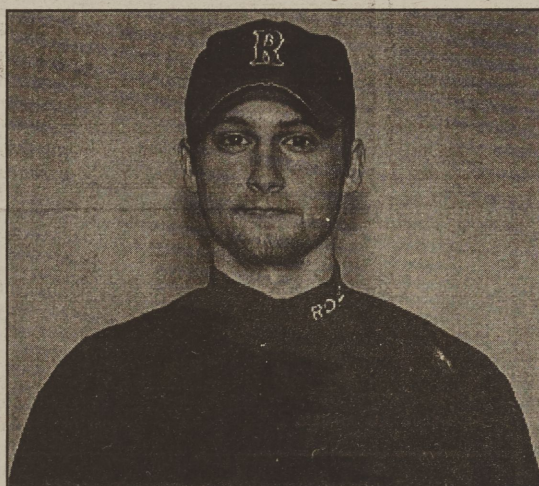
Rose-Hulman (19-19-1) will have one more shot in the double-elimination tournament with a battle against SCAC West division #3 Millsaps College (18-18-1) in a game scheduled for 3:30 p.m. today. Millsaps defeated East division number one DePauw

(23-12) 15-5 earlier on Thursday.

The SCAC West swept Thursday's first round action with Trinity's (32-9) 7-4 win over Oglethorpe.

Senior first baseman Marc McCullough led the Engineers with two hits and an RBI double. Junior Steve Krause added a ninth-inning single for Rose.

Trouble began brewing for the Engineers early in the contest when Southwestern stormed out to a 5-0 lead after five runs in the second inning. Starting pitcher Robert Chandler, who took the loss, was removed from the game and replaced by freshman Ryan Keefer who allowed just one unearned run over the next three innings.



Robert Chandler struggled early, giving up five runs in the first inning as he took the loss. The Engineers will be back in action this afternoon when they take on Millsaps College.

The SCAC Tournament is being held at the USA Baseball Olympic Training Ground in Millington, Tennessee, with the championship game slated for Sunday morning at 10 a.m.

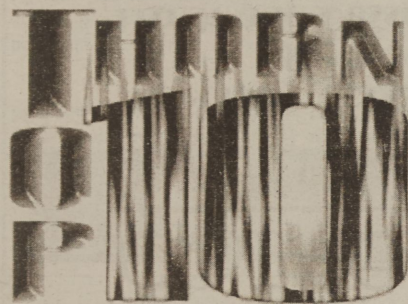

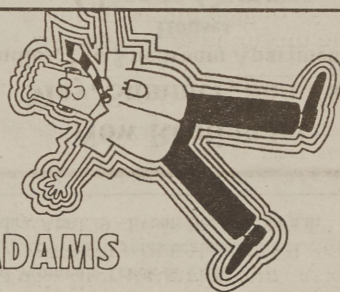
